AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 6-1 and 6-8, and to create Sections 6-18 to allow for the keeping of bees within the city of La Crosse to follow approved "La Crosse Food Growing Guide."

SECTION I: Section 6-1 is hereby amended to read as follows:

## Sec. 6-1. – Definitions

Apiary means the assembly of one (1) or more colonies of honeybees at a single location.

Beekeeper means a person who owns or has charge of one (1) or more colonies of honeybees.

<u>Beekeeping equipment</u> means anything used in the operation of an apiary, such as hive bodies, supers, frames, top and bottom boards and extractors.

*Honeybee* means all life stages of the common domestic honeybee, *Apis mellifera* species of European origin.

- (1) <u>Colony means an aggregate of honeybees consisting principally of workers, but having, when perfect, one (1) queen and at times, drones, brood, combs, and honey.</u>
- (2) Hive means the receptacle inhabited by a colony that is manufactured for that purpose.
- (3) <u>Nucleus colony</u> means a small quantity of honeybees with a queen housed in a smaller than usual hive box designed for a particular purpose.

All other provisions of Section 6-1 shall remain unchanged.

SECTION II: Section 6-8 is hereby amended to read as follows:

## Sec. 6-8. - Animals and species prohibited within the city.

The species named in this section and vicious or wild animals as defined in section 6-1 are by their nature or actions considered to be a public nuisance and are hereby declared to be a nuisance within the City and may not be kept by any person within the City limits of La Crosse. Species prohibited by this section are: livestock, including all cattle, horses, mules and donkeys, sheep and goats and swine; and also all mink, foxes, skunks, raccoons, ehickens, pigeons, geese, ducks, bees, poisonous snakes, alligators, crocodiles and other wild animals as defined in section 6-1. This section does not apply to agricultural zoned districts of the City and animals permitted in connection with lawful uses therein or wild animals as permitted in section 6-9. This section shall further not apply to licensed lofts for the keeping of homing, sporting or show pigeons that were established lofts existing prior to January 1, 2005, and maintain a license for such loft or lofts under section 6-15. This section does not apply to the keeping of chickens as provided in section 6-16 or beekeeping as provided in section 6-18.

SECTION III: Section 6-18 is hereby created to read as follows:

## Sec. 6-18. – Beekeeping.

Residents may own, keep or harbor honey bees for personal use subject to the provisions of this Code.

- (1) <u>Location</u>. The apiary shall be located in the rear yard or side yard at least twenty-five (25) feet from primary buildings on abutting lots and ten (10) feet from public sidewalks.
- (2) <u>Flyway Barrier</u>. The flyway barrier shall consist of a wall, fence, dense vegetation, or a combination thereof, such that honeybees will fly over rather than through the material to reach the colony. The flyway barrier does not surround the entire property.
  - a. Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, in each instance where a colony is kept less than twenty-five (25) feet from a property line of the lot upon which the apiary is located, as measured from the nearest point on the hive to the property line, and any entrances to the hive faces that lot line, the beekeeper shall establish and maintain a flyway barrier at least six (6) feet in height. If a flyway barrier of dense vegetation is used, the initial planting may be four (4) feet in height, so long as the vegetation normally reaches six (6) feet in height or higher. The flyway barrier must continue parallel to the apiary lot line for ten (10) feet in either direction from the hive.
  - b. A flyway barrier is not required if the property adjoining the apiary lot line is undeveloped, zoned agricultural or industrial, or is a wildlife management area or naturalistic park land with no trails located within twenty-five (25) feet of the apiary lot line.
  - c. A flyway barrier is not required if the hives are located on the roof of a structure containing at least one (1) full story, provided all hives are located at least five (5) feet from the side of the structure and at least fifteen (15) feet from any adjacent and occupied structure.
- (3) <u>Colony Density</u>. No person is permitted to keep more than two (2) colonies on any lot within the city, except on lots of five (5) acres or more where no more than four (4) colonies may be kept.
- (4) <u>Liability</u>. Beekeeper shall assume any and all liability for their bees, determine whether their homeowner's or renter's insurance covers bees, and secure additional insurance, if necessary.
- (5) *Unlawful Conduct*.

- a. Notwithstanding compliance with the various requirements of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any beekeepers to keep any colony or colonies in such a manner or of such disposition as to cause any unhealthy condition, interfere with the normal use and enjoyment of human or animal life of others or interfere with the normal use and enjoyment of any public property or property of others.
- b. It shall be unlawful for any beekeeper to own, keep or harbor any exotic strain of bees, such as any African or Africanized honey bees, or any developed strain of bee not known to be normally present in the State that may present a hazard to beekeeping and/or the public.
- c. Notwithstanding compliance with the various requirements of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to maintain an apiary or to keep any colony on any property in a manner that threatens public health or safety, or creates a nuisance.
- d. Notwithstanding compliance with the various requirements of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to maintain an apiary or to keep any colony on any property in a manner that threatens public health or safety, or creates a nuisance.
- e. <u>If an investigation from the City reveals that the use of bees is in violation of this section or any other section of this Code the City shall have authority to require the owner or user of the property to fix, abate, or alleviate the problem.</u>

## (6) Standards of Practice.

- a. <u>Honeybee colonies shall be kept in hives with removable frames, which shall be kept in sound and usable condition.</u>
- b. Each beekeeper shall ensure that a convenient source of water is available to the colony continuously between March 1 and October 31 of each year. The water shall be in a location that minimizes any nuisance created by bees seeking water on neighboring property.
- c. Each beekeeper shall ensure that no wax comb or other material that might encourage robbing by other bees are left upon the grounds of the apiary lot. Such materials once removed from the site shall be handled and stored in sealed containers, or placed within a building or other insect-proof container.
- d. For each colony permitted to be maintained under this ordinance, there may also be maintained upon the same apiary lot, one (1) nucleus colony in a hive structure not to exceed one (1) standard nine and five-eighths inch (9 5/8") depth ten-frame hive body with no supers (where the surplus honey is stored).
- e. <u>Beekeepers are advised to pursue coursework through the La Crosse Area</u> <u>Beekeepers Association or similar educational source.</u>
- f. Notwithstanding compliance with the various requirements of this subsection, it shall be unlawful for any person to maintain an apiary or to keep any colony on

any property in a manner that threatens public health or safety, or creates a nuisance.

(7) <u>Maintenance</u>. Each beekeeper shall maintain his beekeeping equipment in good condition, including keeping the hives painted and securing unused equipment from weather, potential theft or vandalism, and occupancy by swarms. Attracting a swarm, even if the beekeeper is not intentionally keeping honeybees, shall be a violation of this ordinance. The beekeeper will have 30 days from the time of the complaint to bring the hive/hives into compliance.

SECTION IV: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
