Wolfgang Auer, a Friedberg, Germany-based artist, made public works of art in the form of bronze sculptures and fountains until 2007 when his daughter was born. The artist credits his daughter as his inspiration to alter the subject matter and style of his creations: the pieces created after his daughter's birth are modeled after her and have to do with the anxieties that Auer associates with parenthood. Some have suggested that Auer's Blue Babies are a continuation of the visual tradition of children symbolizing hope, love, new life, innocence, and purity, Auer has created other Blue Babies that have been on display all over Europe.

In addition to *Hatched Baby*, Auer also made similar infants in crawling positions. All of the babies have the same distinct blue skin, wide curious eyes, fully-grown teeth, and monumental size, which give the sculptures of infants a physical and emotional power rarely afforded to small children or representations of them.
