

LA CROSSE IN THE 1918 PANDEMIC

"No great ship sank, no armies clashed, no conflagration consumed a community. The flu spread insidiously by means of ordinary coughs and sneezes, borne through communities along the channels of human contact." — Steven Burg Historian

Just over 100 years ago, World War I was de-scalating in September 1918 with the return of many United States troops headed back to American soil. Along with them came the deadly 'Spanish Fluf from Europe. The last five days of September sav an increase from 6 to 97 cases in Wisconsin. That number gree to 256 new cases in one week. Not unlike the current pandemic COVID-19, the Midwest escaped the worst of the dire situation compared to densely populated areas. Reports in the newspaper and medial foretold of the invelvable arrival of sickness and possible death coming from the east and the army camps which would eventually touch every coules and valley in La Crosse County.

Tribune files reported that Vingers' funeral gonession was 'the largest military burial ever held in this city.' The firing squad, the buglers and each of his pallbearers were members of Company B who had specifically been 'over the top' of the trenches with Vingers the day he died. Pullbearers were listed as Charles Shadich, Roy Turner, Walter Gerbel, John Kooll. Stewart Helber and Robert Halte.

In August 1921, three years after his death, the body of La Crosse's Sot. Roy L. Vingers

was laid to rest in Oak Grove Cemetery after the funeral process
