**Issue Statement 1**: The City's neighborhoods hold great promise and deserve increased involvement and problem-solving assistance from the municipal government, institutional and community organizations, businesses, and neighborhood residents. Our neighborhoods need help to overcome the challenges of unkempt and dilapidated properties, criminal activities, and aging infrastructure, and to improve the quality and variety of housing choices for their residents. There have been numerous efforts to improve the livability of the City's Neighborhoods over the last 25 years, but it has not been a community-wide imperative until now. Previous efforts were well-intended, achieved some good results, & may have stemmed the tide of deterioration, but much more can & must be done to revitalize the City's neighborhoods.

**Issue Statement 2**: There is a role for each & every City department, non-profit organization, institution, business, club, group, association, and individual in this community to strengthen La Crosse's neighborhoods. Stable neighborhoods are the city's number one asset & must be the number one priority of City government. Stable neighborhoods must be a high priority for all others. Revitalizing La Crosse's neighborhoods will require a comprehensive approach by all, with each doing more than they thought they were capable of doing. Neighborhood revitalization includes: enforcing the municipal code, preventing crime and promoting safety, improving housing, providing essential services, repairing and replacing infrastructure, zoning for community-based solutions, and creating context-sensitive approaches for each neighborhood.
