Status


- **O** Shelter openings

- 80 Total unsheltered population (estimate)



B. Potential of an Effective Homeless Response

1. Rockford, Illinois

- In January of 2017, became the *first community in the United States* to end both chronic and veteran homelessness
- 2. The Coulee Collaborative to End Homelessness (La Crosse)
 - In December of 2016, following a 100-day effort, <u>housed all</u> <u>homeless veterans</u> in the City of La Crosse
 - 3. Emergency Family Shelter Plan (La Crosse)
 - During this past winter (2022-23), coordinated a system response that provided <u>emergency shelter, resource connections and / or case</u> <u>management to 86 families</u>

Ending Homelessness in La Crosse **Doing Different**

A. *Historical role* of City / County in addressing homelessness

- **Participants** and supporters of community-led efforts
- Not the driver, convener or plan administrator
- A recent more active role in *short-term emergency responses*



Ending Homelessness in La Crosse **Doing Different**

B. What's changing going forward

- The City of La Crosse and La Crosse County will be a <u>unified, aligned and</u> pro-active coordinator of local homeless response
- This transition will begin with the development of a <u>5-year Homelessness</u>
 <u>Response Plan</u> covering the City of La Crosse
- Less effort and resources toward sporadic short-term "fixes" as the homeless response system becomes more stable and effective at delivering results



Ending Homelessness in La Crosse **Doing Different**

C. Why the change

- <u>Alignment</u> is needed across multiple stakeholders and agencies for an effective homelessness response
- A larger and more stable coordinating organization (" **<u>backbone</u>** ") is necessary to sustain a successful collective approach
- Increased investments by the City and County bring more <u>responsibility</u> to ensure funding is spent effectively
- Growing **public demand** for solutions

Ending Homelessness in La Crosse **Next Steps**

A. Plan Development

- <u>Working together with housing agencies and other</u> <u>stakeholders</u> to develop a five-year City / County plan (to be completed later this year)
- 2. <u>*Resourcing and financing*</u> plan that will include maximizing existing resources, financial asks to community foundations and leveraging new state and federal funding opportunities



Ending Homelessness in La Crosse **Next Steps**

B. What to Expect as Part of a Plan

- 1. An aligned goal: achieve *"functional zero"*
- 2. Using a *"Housing First-Plus"* approach with highly coordinated:
 - Street outreach Supportive Services
 - Case management
- 3. Exploring *city-held leases* to create additional capacity
- 4. *Funding* from the City / County supporting community housing agencies will be coordinated to support a unified plan
- 5. Improved use of *data* and *evidence-based approaches*

<u>Recap</u>: Key Takeaways

- The City and County will be moving forward in a more aligned and out-front way in coordinating local homeless response efforts
- While ultimate impact will depend on a variety of factors, enhanced coordination will improve our community's homelessness response
- A 5-year plan will be completed later this year, with implementation expected in early 2024
