To Members of the Common Council of the City of La Crosse,

This document has been prepared in response to resolution #24-0817 passed by the Common Council on June 17, 2024, directing all necessary staff to provide multiple options for interim overnight shelter in writing within three weeks of the adoption of the Resolution.

This conceptual document is meant to fulfill the requirements of the resolution. According to the Pathways to Housing list, which is a by-name list of people experiencing homelessness in the City of La Crosse, there are approximately 230 individuals living in the La Crosse community without permanent and secure housing. There are approximately 70 individuals staying in local fully occupied shelters (Salvation Army and New Horizons). Therefore, it has been determined that an option or combination of options for the remaining 160 individuals would be needed to provide adequate shelter or secure living option. The options provided in this document seek to address the needs of the aforementioned 160 individuals in a viable manner; something that is likely to be achievable. If, for example, property owner is not willing to allow a parcel to be used for this purpose or require approvals that seem highly unlikely or unattainable that option is not included for the purposes of this document.

Work was conducted within the limited timeline allocated by #24-0817 to comprehensively assess space and location options that have been considered repeatedly in the past few years. All potential options were considered and evaluated within a viability matrix that included discussions of access of emergency service personnel, available infrastructure to address hygienic needs, cost of needed improvements, and whether a parcel was likely to be readily available for use, among other considerations.

Based on lessons learned from past experiences providing a space or shelter, considering the number of individuals for which an appropriate space would need to be provided, and through evaluation of current space availability, a mixture of indoor and outdoor spaces is likely

necessary to effectively provide services for the current population of individuals experiencing homelessness. Among the considerations of this determination is the sheer number of individuals needing services, the likelihood many individuals would be unwilling to stay at an indoors facility because, among other reasons, the lack of pet access, and other considerations that can be numerous and unique to individuals. Location decisions also need to consider access for those with disabilities, availability of electrical infrastructure to accommodate storage of medication for certain individuals as well as whether locations would need to zoning changes to allow the intended use.

Among the most significant considerations for any location is the level of staffing necessary to ensure health, safety, and environmental stability. Based on significant past experiences, it was determined that adequate staffing should be prioritized for both indoor and outdoor locations. Appropriate training and qualifications are critical of any staff who are to work with individuals identified by this council resolution. Potential staff additions include, but are not limited to, maintenance, security, and supportive care workers. Volunteers can be included to assist in staffing needs but would need proper coordination and should not be considered as additional personnel in lieu of appropriate professional staff due to liability and safety considerations.

Possible locations both within the City of La Crosse and nearby municipalities.

After a vetting process of parcels identifiable as potential sites, the most currently viable have been identified. In addition to sites evaluated within La Crosse city limits, conversations to identify potential sites outside of the city occurred with representatives from the Village of Holmen, City of Onalaska, Village of West Salem, Village of Bangor, Town of Onalaska, City of La Crescent, La Crosse County, Sparta, City of Tomah, Town of Shelby, Town of Medary, Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Wisconsin Department of Administration and the School District of La Crosse. A message was left with the Town of Campbell, but staff were unable to connect with a representative there. No immediate or unique options were provided although representatives from some municipalities seemed open to further discussion, pending governing body approval and provision of additional information for use of open space.

Regardless of the location, additional staff would be required to operate any facility properly and safely. Additionally, any Park property would need approval from the City of La Crosse Board of Park Commissioners.

Potential sites

Indoor

- 1. Catholic Charities Warming Center at 413 3rd Street South. Capacity for approximately 40 people.
- 2. Fire station #10 (former fire station #2) at 626 Monitor Street. 2 toilets, 1 shower, kitchen. Capacity for approximately 30 people.
- 3. Northside Policing Center at 713 St. James St. Capacity for approximately 20 people. 1 shower, 2 kitchenettes, separate men's and women's bathrooms.
- 4. 621 3rd St N. Capacity for approximately 30 people. 1 toilet. No shower.
- 5. Norwood Inn and Suites 148 hotel rooms, 101 Sky Harbour Drive, located in the Town of Campbell. There may be additional unknown costs associated with needed repairs.

Outdoor

- Wittenberg Park. 2945 Wittenberg Place. This property was declared surplus on May 9, 2019, and therefore may not need approval from the Board of Park Commissioners. 8.6acre parcel with bathroom facilities.
- 2. 300 St. Cloud St. 0.93 acre. No on-premises amenities.



3. Green space by City Hall parking lot between 6th and 7th Street. This property is on the list of properties where camping is prohibited. No on-premises overnight or weekend amenities.



- 4. County parking lot at 230 7th St N, tax parcel 17-20167-60, Lot F. Recommendation of using this as a safe parking place for those living in their vehicles. This lot would be accessible from 7:00pm 7:00am. There are similar initiatives in Duluth, MN (https://steppingonupduluth.org/safe-bay) and Brown County/Green Bay, WI (https://bchhcwi.org/safe-park/). This proposal has not been discussed with the County and would be subject to approval of the La Crosse County Board of Supervisors.
- 5. Sherwood Park at 3300 Nottingham Place. No on-premises amenities.
- 6. Erickson Park at 2423 21st Place S. 9.14 acres. Shower and bathroom facilities at nearby Erickson Pool.
- 7. City-owned property at 5248 33rd St S. 1.17 acres.



Projected expenditures related to staff, equipment, security, rental fees, insurance, cleaning costs and any other associated expenses.

Providing dedicated spaces for individuals experiencing homelessness, whether indoors or outdoors, involves various cost factors. These factors can be divided into known and unknown costs, impacting the overall budget required to sustain such initiatives. Costs are estimated based on past experiences, expenses, and rough estimates but not through a formal Request for Proposal process.

Known costs

1. Operational Costs

- Catholic Charities of the Diocese of La Crosse Inc. La Crosse Warming Center: Operates from November to April with a monthly expense of approximately \$50,000. If operational outside these months, the cost remains the same.

- The Salvation Army Services: Annual costs range between \$125,000 and \$150,000 for 20 hours of work per week for six employees. This does not include additional expenses like furnishings, utilities, facilities repair, and janitorial supplies. Their facility is currently at full capacity.

2. Staffing Costs

- City Staff for Outdoor Locations: Estimated at \$400 per week for each staff member, with a minimum of two staff members for 20 hours per week per person. This would result in an annual cost of \$41,600. City Staff would be responsible for daytime cleaning and maintenance of the site and not for security or to provide other services.

3. Security Services

- Estimate of security services ranges from \$1500 - \$2000 per day. This results in an annual cost of \$547,500 - \$730,000. This estimate is from previous costs associated with emergency shelter.

4. Potential Additional Location Amenities

- Portable Toilets: \$80 each per week, serviced 2-3 times per week, or \$105 for ADA accessible units which results in an annual cost of \$9,620 (for two toilets with one of them am ADA unit).

- Dumpsters: \$500 each per month, emptied three times a week which results in an annual cost of \$6,000.

- ADA 4 Station Portable Shower / Restroom Combo Trailer: \$105,760 to purchase (cost from 2021).

5. Infrastructure Costs

- Electricity Infrastructure for Outdoor Spaces: Estimated at \$10,000 if it does not already exist.
- Repairs for bathroom and shower facilities at Erickson Pool: Estimated at \$20,000.
- 6. Additional Items to Be Considered
 - Storage of personal items during the day.
 - Supplies such as chairs and cots.

Unknown Costs

Hidden and Unknown Costs of Establishing Homeless Shelters and Encampments

1. Location-Based Variability

Utility Rates: The cost of utilities such as electricity, water, and heating can vary significantly based on the location of the shelter.

Labor Costs: The availability and cost of skilled labor for maintenance, security, and support services can fluctuate. Ensuring that staff members are adequately trained to deal with the specific needs of homeless individuals, including mental health support and substance abuse counseling, can further increase labor costs.

2. Unidentified Needs and Emergencies

Unexpected Repairs and Maintenance: Facilities may require sudden repairs or upgrades due to wear and tear or unforeseen damages. For example, during extreme weather conditions,

shelters may need additional repairs to roofs or heating systems. The unpredictability of such emergencies may necessitate the allocation of contingency funds.

Increased Demand: Sudden spikes in homelessness can occur which could stress facilities and available resources.

Health Emergencies: Outbreaks of illnesses within shelters can lead to additional healthcare costs and the need for isolation facilities. Managing these health emergencies requires not only medical supplies and healthcare staff but also infrastructure adjustments to create quarantine areas, all of which contribute to unforeseen expenses.

3. Regulatory and Compliance Costs

Local Regulations: Meeting local building codes, health and safety standards, and obtaining necessary permits can incur costs. Compliance with Wisconsin's health and safety regulations for shelters might require additional investments in facility upgrades and regular inspections to ensure ongoing compliance.

Legal Fees: Potential legal challenges or opposition from local residents can lead to protracted legal battles, further increasing costs and delaying project timelines.

4. Community Impact and Interaction

Security Measures: Ensuring the safety of both the shelter residents and the surrounding community can necessitate hiring security personnel and installing surveillance systems.

Community Outreach Programs: Engaging the local community through outreach programs to reduce stigma and build support for the shelters can require significant funding. La Crosse has invested in community meetings, educational campaigns, and collaborative efforts with local organizations to foster a supportive environment for its homeless population. These initiatives help to create a more inclusive community but also require continuous investment.

5. Long-Term Sustainability

Fundraising: Continuous efforts to secure funding through grants, donations, and government assistance are necessary to maintain operations. La Crosse has relied on both state and federal grants—including ARPA dollars, as well as local fundraising campaigns, to support programs related to addressing homelessness. Sustained fundraising efforts are critical to ensure the long-term viability of shelters and to cover unexpected costs.

Partnerships: Developing and maintaining partnerships with local businesses, non-profits, healthcare providers, and educational institutions can be resource-intensive but crucial for sustainability. Partnerships with organizations like the La Crosse Community Foundation and local healthcare providers have been vital in providing comprehensive support to the homeless population. These partnerships require coordination, communication, and sometimes shared funding.

Volunteer Management: Recruiting, training, and retaining volunteers require dedicated resources. La Crosse's shelters depend heavily on volunteers, necessitating ongoing training programs, volunteer coordination efforts, and recognition events to maintain a motivated and effective volunteer workforce. This will also be true for any effort undertaken through city government. The reliance on volunteers adds an element of unpredictability, as volunteer availability can fluctuate.

Estimate of Known Operations Costs (per annum) for potential indoor/outdoor sites:

Indoor:

- 1. Catholic Charities Warming Center at 413 3rd Street South. Capacity for approximately 40 people. Approximately \$300,000.
- 2. Fire station #10 (former fire station #2) at 626 Monitor Street. 2 toilets, 1 shower, kitchen. Capacity for approximately 30 people. Approximately \$190,000 - \$250,000.
- 3. Northside Policing Center at 713 St. James St. Capacity for approximately 20 people. Approximately \$190,000 \$250,000.
- 4. 621 3rd St N. Capacity for approximately 30 people. Approximately \$190,000 \$250,000.
- 5. Norwood Inn and Suites 148 hotel rooms, 101 Sky Harbour Drive, located in the Town of Campbell. Approximately \$2,190,000 \$2,550,000 (includes purchase of \$2,000,000, not an annual operations cost).

Outdoor:

- 1. Wittenberg Park. 2945 Wittenberg Place. Approximately \$609,100 \$800,000
- 2. 300 St. Cloud St. 0.93 acre. Approximately \$609,100 \$800,000
- 3. Green space by City Hall parking lot between 6th and 7th Street. Approximately \$609,100 \$800,000
- 4. County parking lot at 230 7th St N, tax parcel 17-20167-60, Lot F. Unknown administrative costs.

- 5. Sherwood Park at 3300 Nottingham Place. Approximately \$609,100 \$800,000
- 6. Erickson Park at 2423 21st Place S. 9.14 acres. Approximately \$609,100 \$800,000
- 7. City-owned property at 5248 33rd St S. 1.17 acres. Approximately \$609,100 \$800,000

Estimated start date and duration of program.

Factors for the estimated start date of a program would depend on choosing a location and funding, hiring of staff and signing contracts with service providers. Any such program would need to continue until sufficient, sustainable surge shelter and/or housing is identified through the Pathways Housing list. In some capacity, estimates would need to be considered until the end of 2028. The temporary surge shelter timeline as identified in Pathways Home is April 2025.

Program details and rules, including, among other things, hours of operation, check-in procedures, code of conduct.

Since this request is for overnight interim shelter, the hours of 7:00pm – 7:00am are generally assumed.

1. Salvation Army

Currently operates as the primary shelter in La Crosse at one location. Emergency shelter program rules can be modified for new locations that address the following related to rules of conduct at current Salvation Army shelter: Length of stay, visitors, language/aggression, weapons, theft, curfew, tobacco, drugs/alcohol, medications, dress code, sign in/out, pets, et al.

2.Catholic Charities Warming Center

Benevolent organization that is open as an overnight rest spot from November – April. Opening the center year-round would require additional funding. Catholic Charities has their own set of policies and procedures that are generally known by individuals who are unsheltered and use the facility.

3.Outdoor space. Operational hours and protocol may depend on outcome of resolution #24-0876 and requirement to move every 12 hours when camping outdoors. Otherwise, basic rules of conduct will be observed at all times and intended focus is to provide an area to sleep overnight rather than create a long-term outdoor living environment.

Proposals on how to deal with secondary effects of homeless persons once transitioned to interim shelter. For example, when homeless persons leave their location and garbage, abandoned property, and hazardous or infectious materials are left behind.

From past experiences of encampment clean up at Cameron Park, Houska Park, Isle la Plume and River Point District, contractors and staff clean sites with heavy machinery and hand-pick to clear out small items such as plastic detritus and needles. Once interim shelter is established, the same process would need to be achieved at any current encampments. Staff would request assistance from refuse companies as well as add help to assist in cleanup.

Estimated cost of clean-up is between \$10,000 - \$30,000 per site. This estimate is from previous costs associated clean-up efforts and depends greatly on size, location, and number of individuals in an established encampment.

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Introduction

Homelessness is a significant issue in La Crosse, as it is in many cities across the nation. The common question posed is: "Where should the homeless go?" Our belief is simple and compassionate: they should be able to go about their day like any other citizen. To achieve this, they need essential services such as a place to store their belongings, showers, laundry, meals, and a place to sleep. This proposal outlines how the City of La Crosse might utilize an intake facility and process to assign temporary home bases, meeting these needs and supporting our homeless population in leading dignified lives.

Objectives

- 1. **Provide Secure Storage**: To offer safe storage solutions for personal belongings.
- 2. Hygiene Facilities: To ensure access to showers and laundry services.
- 3. Food Security: To provide regular, nutritious meals.
- 4. Shelter: To create safe sleeping spaces.
- 5. **Support Services**: To offer additional support such as job training, counseling, and healthcare.
- 6. **Temporary Homebase Assignment**: To ensure every individual has a stable, consistent base.

Proposed Solution: Centralized Intake Facility/Process Where Each Participant Has An Assigned Temporary Home Base

Centralized Intake Facility/Process

Location: A centrally located space in La Crosse, ideally an office in an underutilized municipal building or repurposed vacant property that is or could be open a few hours a day 7 days a week.

Implementation:

- Establish the intake facility and process as the first point of contact for homeless individuals.
- Complete a brief initial assessment to understand individual needs and circumstances.
- Assign each person a temporary homebase within designated properties in La Crosse.
- Ensure each homebase includes secure storage, hygiene facilities, food services, and sleeping quarters.

Key Services Provided by each Homebase Facility

1. Secure Storage

Implementation:

- Provide lockers or storage bins in a locked room at each assigned homebase.
- Develop and implement a process to ensure access to secured storage.
- Ensure proper security measures are in place (ie camera in the store area).

Rationale: Secure storage allows homeless individuals to keep their belongings safe, reducing the burden of carrying everything with them and preventing theft or loss. Ensuring access provides flexibility and peace of mind.

2. Hygiene Facilities

Implementation:

- Ensure each homebase has access to showers and laundry machines.
- Provide toiletries and laundry supplies.
- Maintain cleanliness and hygiene standards.

Rationale: Access to showers and laundry facilities helps individuals maintain personal hygiene, boosting their self-esteem and health, and enabling them to present themselves well for job opportunities.

3. Food Security

Implementation:

- Partner with local food banks and charities to supply food.
- Organize regular meal schedules (breakfast, lunch, dinner) at each homebase.
- Ensure a variety of nutritious options are available.

Rationale: Consistent access to nutritious meals can alleviate the stress of food insecurity and contribute to better overall health.

4. Shelter

Implementation:

- Convert properties already identified by the City into homebase shelters with individual sleeping spaces assigned via the intake facility.
- Provide bedding and personal space for each individual.
- Ensure the homebase shelters are safe, clean, and well-supervised.
- Require residents to vacate the homebase shelters between 7 AM and 7 PM daily.

Rationale: Providing a secure place to sleep is fundamental to addressing homelessness, giving individuals a safe space to rest and recuperate. A designated home base ensures stability and a sense of

belonging. Vacating the shelters during the day encourages individuals to engage in community activities, access services, and seek employment.

5. **Support Services through the Pathways Home Project**

Implementation:

- Offer job training programs and employment assistance.
- Provide mental health and addiction counseling.
- Ensure access to healthcare services.
- Facilitate social services to help individuals transition out of homelessness into permanent housing.

Rationale: Comprehensive support services are crucial for addressing the root causes of homelessness and assisting individuals in becoming self-sufficient.

Phase 2 May include Community Appointed Advocacy Program

Implementation:

- Assign each individual a trained community advocate.
- Advocates will assist in navigating social services, healthcare, job training, and housing programs.
- Ensure ongoing support to address any barriers to self-sufficiency.

Rationale: Community advocates will provide personalized support, helping individuals understand and access the systems in place to aid their transition out of homelessness. This tailored assistance increases the likelihood of successful outcomes.

Conclusion

Addressing homelessness requires a holistic approach that provides not just shelter but a supportive environment where individuals can regain their dignity and independence. By establishing a centralized intake facility and process, La Crosse can efficiently assign temporary home bases that meet the fundamental needs of the homeless population. This approach not only benefits those directly affected by homelessness but also fosters a more inclusive and compassionate community.

Call to Action

We urge the City of La Crosse to consider this proposal and take the necessary steps to implement these solutions. By doing so, we can ensure that our homeless population is treated with the respect and dignity they deserve and that they have the opportunity to go about their day with the same sense of purpose and normalcy as any other resident.

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Dear Mr. Happel,

May I please submit to you a concern I have with an issue that will be on the upcoming Common Council agenda?

I was shocked to read about the proposal set to go before the La Crosse Common Council on August 8 meant to address overnight shelter needs of the unhoused, in which Erickson Park is named as one of the proposed outdoor sites. While I agree that solutions are necessary, I feel strongly that placement of such an encampment would be highly inappropriate directly adjacent to an elementary school.

It is unfair to generalize about all unhoused individuals contributing to unsafe conditions within such encampments, but among my concerns are issues outlined in the proposal itself including: "ensuring the safety of both the shelter residents and surrounding community can necessitate hiring security personnel," "when homeless persons leave their location and garbage, abandoned property, and hazardous or infectious materials are left behind," "from past experiences of encampment clean up at Cameron Park, Houska Park, Isle la Plume and River Point District, contractors and staff clean sites with heavy machinery and hand-pick to clear out small items such as plastic detritus and needles" and other references being "based on significant past experiences."

I don't know if the Council-person's proposal was based on the possibility of Spence being closed as a school, but obviously that referendum has not yet passed, and if it does, the timeline of a new school being constructed does not coincide with the City's need for an immediate solution for housing needs to be addressed. While I do appreciate that this proposal better addresses what the Salvation Army had previously highlighted as concerns beyond simply placing people in consolidated areas for shelter, such as access to social services, emergency services, security, mental health resources and drug/alcohol counseling, please ensure that your selection of future sites are made without adversely affecting the youngest and most vulnerable in our community!

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Concerns Regarding the Proposed Relocation of Unhoused Individuals to the South Side

Dear Members of the City Council,

I am writing to express my concerns regarding the proposed relocation of unhoused individuals to the South Side. As a resident near the proposed sites and a frequent user of Sherwood Park, I am deeply concerned about how this plan could impact both the accessibility of local amenities and the broader well-being of our community.

1. Impact on Local Amenities: The relocation plan could significantly restrict access to essential community spaces such as Sherwood Park. This park is not only a crucial recreational area for local residents but also a safe, accessible place I rely on for outdoor activities. Losing easy access to this park would be particularly distressing for someone like me, who has been in the neighborhood only a month and values the ability to walk to nearby amenities without the need to cross a highway. 2. The biggest question on my mind being why the focus isn't on providing actual assistance and stable solutions for these individuals, rather than repeatedly moving them from one location to another without addressing the underlying issues? 4. Need for Reevaluation: The increasing number of unhoused individuals in our community signals the ineffectiveness of current strategies, highlighting an urgent need for new approaches that focus on long-term solutions rather than temporary fixes. This growing issue calls for a comprehensive review and implementation of sustainable support systems, including mental health services and medical care. The fact that the unhoused population continues to expand rather than decline raises serious concerns about our community's commitment to addressing and resolving the root causes of homelessness. 5. Successful Models: Numerous cities have shown that initiatives such as "tiny homes" can provide safe, dignified, and permanent housing solutions that effectively support the reintegration of unhoused individuals into society. Importantly, these initiatives do not necessarily require funding from taxpayers; there are many innovative funding models that can be explored. The persistence of the housing crisis indicates that as a community, we may not be exploring enough diverse solutions, often defaulting to temporary relocations or constructing high-cost, low-capacity housing developments. This approach is not only inefficient but fails to address the scale of the problem. It's crucial to consider more cost-effective, large-scale solutions that can accommodate more individuals and truly alleviate the burden of homelessness.

I urge the City Council to consider these points and to adopt innovative and compassionate strategies that tackle the root causes of homelessness. Reflecting on the origins of this crisis, researching solutions implemented by other communities, and scrutinizing the effectiveness of current spending are crucial steps. For instance, the funds allocated for a minimally used bike lane downtown could have been directed towards more impactful projects. By investing in comprehensive support systems and permanent housing solutions, we can uplift every member of our community.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. I am hopeful for a strategy that reflects our shared values of empathy and community support.

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HOMELESS ENCAMPMENTS DO NOT BELONG IN CITY NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS.

Homeless encampments should not be put in residential neighborhood parks period!

The failed experiment at Houska Park should show all that this was a very BAD idea and that park wasn't even in a residential area. There are many well documented reasons how and why it failed. Just the cleanup alone with its \$100,000 cost and many safety risks from discarded drug paraphernalia are a huge concern.

Putting it in a residential area would be only be inviting more potential problems, such as assaults, thefts and break ins. About 80% of the people in my Cliffside neighborhood are elderly and many of them are vulnerable as well. They may live alone, have health issues, physical impairments and limited ability to get help quickly. Many of us leave our homes for months at a time, especially in the winter. How would we be able to feel confident that our home would be safe?

Considering putting an encampment in Johnson Park on 33rd St is nonsense. The park is part of the Pammel Creek Walkway and there are numerous homes that back up to the path within 10 feet of their back doors. An easy target for an intruder to break into quickly and mostly unobstructed and most of these residents are elderly. We urge you all to walk it and see it for yourself. Johnson Park is a small neighborhood park catering mostly to young families using the play equipment. There is little area for tents and NO permanent hygiene facilities. There's one porta potty there but today we observed some guys from a lawn crew who got out of their truck to use the potty. Evidently one had to go really bad cuz we got to watch him walk into the bushes to relieve himself. He wasn't far enough into the bushes to hide and we dread to think that this would become an everyday occurrence. "Campers" would literally only be 10-50 feet away from homes, perhaps closer.

Violence at the Houska Encampment was a regular occurrence and we would no longer feel safe daily walking our dog on the path that's accessed in the park.

We pay over \$4,000 in property taxes to live in our forever home that we saved for over 50 years. We don't wish to leave La Crosse but we would certainly consider other options if there are homeless encampments in city parks.

Parks are not meant to be drug dens. There are resources for those who wish to change and many of these homeless people are not willing to use them to change. It's not safe for those of us who live our lives next to them.

Over the past few years, I have felt more and more uncomfortable and unsafe in areas I would normally feel safe, due to the homeless encampments.

I have worked directly with those with mental illness and addiction for over 20 years. I am very passionate about getting them the best help we can. What I do not believe in, is the way the city enables this population, by allowing them to continue to destroy our property with leaving their garbage all over the city. In order to help those who are using drugs and alcohol, as well as those with mental illness, we need to ensure we don't do too much for them, having them rely on handouts, rather than working on improving themselves and getting the help they need.

It would make sense to me, for the city to put up a large pull shed, tent, some type of structure, in the parking lot between the Salvation Army and the County Adm Center (as this parking lot is no longer needed). Dear Council,

I am writing to express the many feelings I have regarding the Homeless Encampment research and discussion that will be in front of the common council on Thursday, August 8. I am concerned that most of the locations in the proposal are in or near residential areas that are heavily populated with young families or senior citizens and that the resolution does nothing to address the actual problem.

The location on 33rd Street is near my home. This is a neighborhood that is made up of mostly senior citizens and a large number of young families. Additionally, is this what we want as a first impression to visitors as they enter our city?

Erickson Park is located next to an elementary school. Exposing young elementary children to the homeless population should not be an option. The additional suggestion to use the Erickson Pool bathroom and shower facilities is also not giving any consideration to the many families of La Crosse. Erickson Pool has been considered the "flagship" swimming pool for a number of years. I regularly visited Erickson Pool with my two boys for swimming lessons, log-rolling and to swim during their younger years. They worked there during the last four summers as lifeguards, swim instructors and pool attendants. The pool was closed this summer for maintenance that has yet to be started as of the writing of this letter. Is the lack of supposed work to be done poor planning on the part of the city or a strategic move to use the location for the homeless? As stated in the report, past experience has shown any facilities used by the homeless will be destroyed and require massive cleanup and/or rebuilding of structures. Destroying a community swimming pool that should be available to the tax paying and contributing families of La Crosse should not be a consideration. Our community must stop enabling the homeless population and take steps to resolve the problem. Past attempts to assist the homeless population to find jobs and housing to become persons who contribute to our community have not been followed through on. There are plenty of services that have been offered to "the 230 individuals living in the La Crosse community without permanent and secure housing". The majority of the homeless population chooses not to take action to better their situation. Consequences of that choice should result in notice that services will not be provided past a set period of 30-60 days. Continuing to provide services with no demand for accountability or action from the person accepting those services has clearly exasperated the homeless situation and become an invitation for others to come to La Crosse to take advantage of the situation. Those services are not free to anyone who has a job and pays taxes in this city. It makes me sad that La Crosse has become a community that cares more about the homeless and throwing our tax dollars away while watching people destroy our community and its facilities than looking out for our actual tax paying citizens that are contributing to make this a better place.

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Dear Dedicated Public Servants, council members, mayor, department heads and teams,

We have not found the solution that fits . . . yet.

The solution is NOT a park. The solution is not a hotel or any other nonpublic asset for accommodation. Yes, I believe it needs to be a public or nonprofit facility, but I am not certain a perfect place exists. What do th experts think? What do the persons versed in these types of populations advise?

We all have needs, as Maslow said there are certain needs as human beings: food, water, shelter. However, how many parks, trails, or additional facilities are we going to allow to be trashed.

Many of the unsheltered are addicts and cannot function or reason appropriately. Therefore make bad choices that affect all of us in the community. We even have infiltration of this population south to the southern edges of the city.

Many lack even a basic level of self-respect as evidenced by their inability to clean up themselves and their 'camping' area, find work, follow through with agencies dedicated to assist: Salvation Army, churches, Catholic Charities, food van, HIV clinic van, etc.

How do we, how can we help this needy population? I do not know, but we need to. We must for the future of our great city and our children, families, populations, and beyond.

Do we have a building we can place them into which can be hosed down, sanitized, cleaned periodically, yet which can facilitate oversight, hygiene, auditing of health, needs, security, additions, etc.Different level of need on different floors/areas.

I do believe part of the solution should be the nonprofit organizations whose mission is to help and house the poor, etc. as they are exempt from paying taxes for this mission but I am not sure they are equipped to facilitate this population and their vast and varied needs.

It breaks my heart to see what goes on each and every day from the building I work in which is directly proximal to the marsh unsheltered population: needles, cars/bikes/vans/parts/trash clogging up sidewalk, streets, parking lots; intimidation and unsecure routes to our parking lots/vehicles/outdoor spaces; filth, garbage, profanity, seedy behaviors in plain view of all populations; requisite warnings to visitors to our beautiful city to be aware of these populations as they could be offensive and violent; threatening, and unseemly; blood and other body fluids on our business thoroughfares, garbage, drug paraphernalia, etc. on these same areas has prompted increased lighting and security cameras. Observations of dump trucks, skid steers, and other equipment; our police and fire personnel, auditing entities, HIV agency, food agencies, etc.

It saddens me to see the city I have called my home for over 55 years treated with such disrespect and lacking in value to these human beings; it distresses me to see the children and pets under duress because of the choices, or not, of their legal guardian(s).

I believe this population needs to be housed in a building, with 24/7 monitors; a facility capable of periodic disinfection and cleaning; and these people if they are to be housed there need to comply; if not then they need to leave our city.

How? Where? who?

Not parks or trails as we tried that;

not a hotel as we tried that.

I beg you to please take action to ban camping in the marshlands in the City of La Crosse at your meetings on Thursday August 8, 2024.

You have heard from your citizens about the damage to the Marsh, which protects our city from flooding and is home to many flora and fauna. You have heard from tourists, visitors and organizations who utilize the marsh trails, about the abhorrent situation they find along Vietnam Veterans' and Asfoor trails. And the squalor continues to worsen. How many letters have you received from people who have witnessed needles, drug deals, and people shooting up along the trail?

On August 10, Friends of the Marsh are asking for volunteers to sit by the River Architect building on the Veterans trail all day and count people using the trail. On September 14, thousands of families, many of whom travel from all over the country to participate, are planned to walk that trail in support of breast cancer research. 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Dear La Crosse Council Members,

I am unable to attend the City Council Meeting on Thursday, August 8th, due to a previously scheduled commitment. Therefore, please enter my comments into the record.

According to the online agenda packet, under "Potential Sites – Indoor" for housing the homeless, *Norwood Inn & Suites* is listed as a potential site. As a taxpayer, a homeowner with children, and resident of French Island, this raises multiple, serious concerns.

According to a letter written on March 9, 2022 to the City of La Crosse Council Members by Major Alan Hellstrom, Corps Officer of the Salvation Army, when the homeless were housed at the *Econo Lodge*, many alarming concerns were brought to the Council's attention. Mentioned specifically in the letter was, **"rampant drug use, violence, sex trafficking, drug trafficking and other disturbing events."** This is shocking! <u>Why would the outcome of moving this population into the *Norwood Inn* <u>& Suites, at the taxpayer's expense, have any different results?</u></u>

Has the City of La Crosse and/or the Council Members taken into consideration that there is an elementary school **less that one mile** from the *Norwood Inn & Suites*? This presents a safety hazard to young children on numerous levels. <u>Have the parents and staff of *Summit Environmental School* been notified that this is an option the City of La Crosse is considering?</u>

Has the City of La Crosse and/or the Council Members taken into consideration that there are multiple neighborhoods with young children **directly across the street** from the *Norwood Inn & Suites*? There is also a footbridge next to the *Norwood Inn & Suites* that leads to multiple other neighborhoods with young children. Again, presenting a safety hazard to children on numerous levels. <u>Have the homeowners and families in these neighborhoods been notified that this is an option the City of La Crosse is considering?</u>

French Island is a small community and has an excellent police force that works tirelessly to keep this community safe. <u>Has the City of La Crosse and/or the Council Members taken into consideration</u> <u>how this will strain the Town of Campbell Police resources?</u>

Has the City of La Crosse and/or the Council Members taken into consideration that community resources (social services, healthcare, full-service grocery stores, etc...) are not within walking distance of the *Norwood Inn & Suites* (for those who do not have cars) and would require travel on and off French Island? How are people being transported to needed resources and how is it being paid for?

Relocating a homeless population into neighborhoods filled with young families less than a mile of an elementary school will impact crime rates, property values and the community's safety. <u>How are the taxpayers and homeowners on French Island being represented, notified and involved in the decision-making process?</u>

It is important to note that the majority of taxpayers *funding* housing the homeless, have lived in this La Crosse community for years, decades, and generations (my family goes back seven generations in this area). Longstanding taxpaying residents have not only invested monetarily in this city, but have grown families here, built businesses here, given back more than they take and care deeply about the La Crosse community. The homeless population is an undisputed problem not unique to the city of La Crosse. Many homeless are transients, moving from city to city, taking resources where they are available. Taking from cities they have no vested interest in. Taking from residents that care and have invested in their community. This attracts even more transients into the area seeking resources and the more that is given, all the more is taken. Sheltering people in hotels has proven to be extremely costly (in terms of money, safety and crime) and *fails to treat the underlying cause* of homelessness.

The reputation of La Crosse is becoming tarnished by a population that has no long term vested interest in this community. I understand this is a complicated issue, and as a longtime resident of La Crosse, I am extremely concerned about the options the City of La Crosse is considering and the impacts it will have on the taxpaying residents that do love this community and want to see it thrive. I would appreciate hearing a response back on the questions raised in my letter, as well as addressing them during this Thursday's meeting.

My name is Danielle, and I reside on 19th Street South in District 7. I am reaching out to express my concerns about the future of homeless encampments and the potential designation of parks as locations for these camps.

I previously contacted my council member, Mac, but have yet to receive a response, so I am now addressing this issue via email in hopes that my concerns will be heard.

While I understand and appreciate the importance of addressing homelessness, I am deeply troubled by the proposal to include parks, such as Erickson Park near Spence Elementary, as potential sites for encampments. The recent expense incurred for cleaning up Houska Park raises concerns about the financial implications of relocating encampments back to such areas. 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Dear Madams and Sirs;

I wish to submit a written comment to the Common Council pertaining to agenda item 24-1068 for the scheduled August 8th, 2024 Common Council Meeting. I wish to state my opinion that the proposed possible outdoor overnight shelter for the unhoused at Erickson park is poorly thought out and inappropriate.

Erickson park/pool is directly next door to Spence Elementary School where there is no delineation between where the park ends and where the southern playgrounds begin. Even if fencing were constructed, the encampment would butt up against the boundary of where pre-kindergarten through 2nd grade play during recess. While many unhoused individuals do not pose a risk to other individuals, one can't ignore that mental illness (often untreated) and addiction play a part with a portion of the unhoused population. Placing an outdoor encampment near the elementary school would expose students to these issues.

Elementary schools also need to operate with a higher level of security due to the realities of our time. The level of security would need to be even more so at an outdoor encampment at Erickson than at other locations in order to make sure the school boundaries were kept secure and safe. While the possibility exists that Spence may close and a newer elementary school built, the referendum vote has yet to occur. If it passes, construction of a new school would take time. The proposed timeline of the encampment being open from April 2025 into 2028 would coincide with the potential new school's construction timeline while Spence remains open.

Additionally, Erickson park and the ball diamonds are utilized all summer long by youth and adult leagues. Often, parents allow their kids to walk cross Erickson park to play at the Spence playgrounds while ball games take place. The community will no longer be able to utilize Erickson park in the same way either by no longer being able to play at the popular ball diamonds or be able to allow their children to play at the park or playgrounds outside of school hours.

Furthermore, Erickson pool is a popular swimming location in the neighborhood and is continually packed when not closed for repairs. Placing an outdoor encampment at Erickson with access to pool restrooms and showers would either put undue pressure on pool staff and patrons or effectively close a popular city pool that the neighborhood loves.

Lastly, an outdoor encampment for the unhoused is in general a poor idea because it is only a viable housing solution for maybe 6 months of the year. The population of the encampment would have to be moved during the colder months. A year round, indoor facility would be a more viable solution for the people the common council is attempting to help. I would urge the council to pursue an indoor location - possibly a large building that has sat unused for a long duration of time, such as the old Kmart site.

I wholeheartedly urge the Common Council to remove Erickson Park from the list of potential outdoor encampments for the unhoused for the reasons mentioned above. To continue consideration of it as a possible site demonstrates to the families of Spence Elementary and the surrounding neighborhood that the city doesn't prioritize our children when determining their agenda.

I stumbled across the City of La Crosse Common Council agenda for 8/8/2024 and saw that a discussion about housing the homeless population is going to be discussed. I have clear and strong objections to the Norwood Hotel location being used to house the homeless in the future. Bringing the homeless population to French Island is going to be catastrophic for all businesses and households.

My parents live by Olivet Church, as well as many of my family and friends in the same general area. I grew up in that location. I never once felt unsafe, scared or uneasy. I am now a new mother and my sister also has a baby. We love bringing them over to their grandparent's house because of the safety and friendly demeanor of their neighborhood. There are always kids running around and families having fun. We strongly considered purchasing our first home near my old neighborhood.

The homeless population is the complete opposite of safe, friendly and neighborly. If you drive downtown La Crosse, you can clearly see (and hear) this population: heaps of garbage, personal belongings scattered everywhere, physical and verbal altercations, bothering law-abiding citizens for money as they are going into a business, the list goes on and on.

Mental illness and drug and alcohol abuse are common problems within that community; most do not want the help and are a burden on our healthcare system when they frequent area emergency rooms with "ailments" that they don't want to be treated for and rude behaviors. I understand that some accept the help, but most do not. My knowledge is from family and friends working in these local emergency rooms, as well as my personal observations when my family is needing to be seen.

I can assure you that bringing this population to French Island, a beautiful and comfortable place to live, will bring nothing but problems. I have summarized a few below:

1.Town of Campbell will need to hire more police officers to patrol that area, or have neighboring agencies assist, taking away resources in other communities. Crime rates will increase (look at America's Best Value Inn and the EconoLodge) and illegal activities will be taking place.

I am writing about the proposed tent encampment on the corner of 33rd St. in Mormon Coulee Road for our homeless population.

I have a strong, affinity and support for our homeless community in La Crosse. I have worked at UWL for 24 years prior to my early retirement, as the Assistant Director of University Centers overseeing the COVE — Center for Organizations Vision and Engagement. Much of my work centered around volunteer opportunities and connecting students and faculty/staff with needs in the community. I represented UWL in the initial partnership with the United Way, Western Technical College, and Viterbo University to create Ugetconnected for our campus and the greater community.

Closest to my heart, was food and housing insecurity among our students and within our community. I oversaw the UWL food pantry, and was the co-coordinator of a tri-campus and community project that focused on educating and creating awareness among our community regarding our homeless population within La Crosse. The name of that event was Facing Homelessness in La Crosse. Western Technical College students interviewed participants who volunteered to tell their story, UWL Students took those interviews and turned them into written stories which Viterbo Students acted out on stage at the Weber Center March 20 and 21, 2017. I've attached pictures of the program.

I tell you this because I want you to understand that I have sincere compassion for this vulnerable population. I believe it will not in the best interest of the homeless population nor the neighborhood on the corner of Mormon Coulee Road and 33rd St., South to move ahead with this plan.

This population will not be in a safe space at this location. It is located right next to a very busy highway where pedestrians, including myself, have found ourselves in dangerous situations trying to cross on foot. One person was tragically killed not that long ago here. In addition, there is no running water, no bathrooms, no electricity and no services to assist these residents.

The neighborhood surrounding this area is full of families with kids, elderly and retired communities. This encampment poses many concerns for noise, safety, and lower property values.


I understand that there is no easy solution to this situation. I am passionate about this vulnerable population finding a more suitable and safer place to call their temporary home. I am willing to meet with anyone to assist 52

Re: Homeless Encampments - Counsel Meeting August 8, 2024

Mayor Mitch Reynolds:

It has come to my attention that the council will be discussing potential Homeless Encampments at your meeting on August 8th. This is a difficult problem for La Crosse and for most cities and towns in the US. One Park up for discussion is Johnson Park on 33rd Street which is across the street from the development I live in. I was the 3rd person to purchase a home in Juniper Estates in 5/83. The curbs were up but the streets not yet paved. It has been a wonderful home and neighborhood.

The City started working on greening up the area. First of all, the Pammel Creek path was developed running from Boma Road, past Wedgewood Valley, State Road Elementary School, Trane, Hillview NH, the baseball fields, next apartments and condos and then single homes. The Hillview golf course was turned into a housing development. Nice benches were added along Pammel Creek. My neighbor worked with the City to put up a gazebo for people to rest and enjoy the area and eventually a water fountain for refreshment. She developed a floral garden of perennials around the Gazebo and then another garden further south near the playground which has a basketball court and playground equipment for children. Now how does this jive with making it a homeless camp area??

The path is very busy with walkers, joggers, elderly walking with canes, bikes of different types, family outings and pet lovers with their dogs and family members giving their loved one a wheelchair ride. When the weather is good and the sun is out it is a lovely place to be. Does that sound like a homeless encampment environment??

About 10 years or so ago, my neighbor was working on weeding one of the flower gardens close to the underpass. She suddenly noticed someone was behind her. She looked up and there was a homeless man with a knife! She slowly backed away. Fortunately a jogger noticed the problem and came over and asked if she would like help. He took her home and police were called. After that her husband always went with her to garden. Apparently a group of homeless people were living under the overpass. Often they were seen

wandering in backyards and police were called. Eventually it stopped. The police probably moved them.

I, as you might suspect, I do not feel our area should be made into a homeless encampment. It will devalue our property and make it difficult to maintain safety and cleanliness. We all pay our taxes and our expectations are that the city maintain our area. This is a neighborhood of families.

I am wondering if you put Johnson Park on the list because it is quite south of the City - in fact on the way out of town? Where would the showers and toilets be that they will need? Food, etc. It is a concern for them and their potential neighbors.

Thanks for your time. I hope to be at the council meeting on Thursday.

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Good evening,

I write to you as a resident of French Island over 20 years, as a taxpayer, as a mother, and a woman who is concerned about the potential purchase of the Norwood Inn & Suites and acquisition of this property for housing the homeless in the La Crosse area.

Research has indicated that homeless encampments can reduce property values up to 12.7% according to the National Association of Realtors. While I understand that this may not meet the exact definition of a homeless encampment, it seems that the same potential negative impacts will likely be present. In addition, there are many negative impacts that are cited as being shared between homeless shelters and homeless encampments.

The negative elements homeless encampments share with homeless shelters include:

- Higher crime rates
- Increased police calls into the neighborhood
- Damage to residential property by homeless shelter residents
- Significantly increased drug use in the neighborhood
- Increased public intoxication or inebriation
- Increased assaults on and threats to property owners or renters in the neighborhood

Questions I would currently pose for consideration:

1) With the current registered guests at Norwood Inn, what is the reported drug use and police intervention already being needed?

2) How would the City of La Crosse propose to fund the additional police presence that will most likely be needed, as the Town of Campbell would likely not be able to sustain or support any additional increases necessary to protect the full Town of Campbell?

3) What other options within the city limits of La Crosse are being explored?

4) What impact would the ownership of this property have on any potential conversations regarding Annexation of the Town of Campbell by the City of La Crosse?

5) How will the City of La Crosse propose to ensure the safety of the staff of Quillin's and other businesses and the business property near Norwood Inn?

6) What objective data do you have that would indicate that the outcome of this purchase would be any different that the outcome at EconoLodge previously?

7) What considerations are you giving to the decreased property values both now and future, when potentially there would no longer be a homeless shelter onsite?

8) What additional resources will be needed for sanitation to the grounds of Norwood Inn and who will be responsible for those expenses?

9) Sex trafficking has already been indicated as a common occurrence in areas of high homelessness in the La Crosse area - Houska Park and Econo Lodge for example. What will be done to decrease the risk of our children

that may be in that area, coming over the footbridge, to access Quillin's or go into La Crosse? I already do not let my children go to Quillin's alone due to having been approached by individuals that were under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol - in the store and in the parking lot. Those same individuals walked right over to Norwood Inn as their place of residence.

10) What would the City of La Crosse and Town of Campbell cite as benefits to this acquisition versus drawbacks?

11) What resources would be made available to those housed at Norwood Inn to support an avenue of independence and self sufficiency? What happens if those housed are not interested or willing to utilize resources as their individual goal is not independence and self sufficiency?

12) This building was recently under scrutiny for being potentially uninhabitable and deemed to nearly be condemned. What has changed since that determination was made? If not updates have been made, who is funding any necessary remodeling. Taxpayers? One time funding? Isn't that similar as to why Econo Lodge was not purchased?

13) Concerns have already been raised by The Salvation Army about using the Econo Lodge previously. La Crosse Salvation Army receives 'disturbing' reports about EconoLodge homeless shelter, leaders say in letter | La Crosse | news8000.com How would this be any different, especially now that this location is outside of the La Crosse City Limits?

Providing a roof over someone's head is not the same as a solution to homelessness. I do not support the purchase of Norwood Inn by the City of La Crosse as a solution for homeless members of our community. This seems to be a shift of burden from the City of La Crosse to the Town of Campbell. This seems to be a purchase plan with an underlying agenda that will not be brought forth with transparency until it is too late.

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Good evening,

My name is Mary Jo Werner and I am a resident of the town of Campbell. I am writing as a person who is not a resident of the city of La Crosse, but who is concerned about the city of La Crosse's proposal to utilize the property known as Norwood Hotel for the purpose of housing unsheltered individuals. Please see below for my concerns:

1. The Norwood Hotel is designed for short term stays for individuals. Guests stay at the hotel while traveling to another destination or for visiting or working in the area for a short period of time, a few days at most. The hotel rooms are not designed for long term stays. The rooms are not designed for cooking, dining or other activities that would be needed during a long term stay.

2. The location of the hotel is not conducive to accommodate unsheltered individuals. Medical facilities such as clinics and dental buildings are a significant distance away. The hotel is not near places where unsheltered individuals can socialize. It is isolated from other places to accommodate a transition from homeless to full time housing. The building is a long distance from city or county run agencies.

3. The location of the hotel is very close to an exit to an interstate. This exit is not well lit and there is much foliage where possible intruders could lurk to engage in foul play. Some unsheltered individuals are vulnerable children and adults. It would be easy for someone to kidnap or do other harm to these vulnerable people and readily exit the area via the interstate.

4. Removing unsheltered individuals from the city of La Crosse to a physical location outside the city runs counter to providing solutions for the unsheltered individuals. The city of La Crosse has hired individuals to focus on these individuals and their status. By spreading groups of unsheltered individuals to different municipalities, it allows for confusion and inconsistency in monitoring these individuals.

5. Coordination and community concept between the city of La Crosse and the town of Campbell. Currently the town of Campbell is staffed for its current population for both the police and fire departments. An influx of several unsheltered individuals whose backgrounds (single person, family, mental health concern) are unknown, is set up for failure. Developing a formal plan that is coordinated and agreed upon by all parties involved, helps ensure success.

At this time, my suggestion would be to postpone or table this idea of using Norwood Hotel for unsheltered individuals.

French Island is not a place for homeless people who leave needles lay outside, create filth & distruction where every they go. The more handouts we give the more we attract homeless.

A police report was filed a couple days ago. A homeless man was by Family restaurant Northside La Crosse. He was visual to a woman and her children eating a meal. He pulled down his pants and urinated, then pulled his pants down and deficated. He pulled his pants down again using a towel to wipe himself front to back.

I worked for La Crosse City Housing Authority. In the 80's I helped Hmong refugies who could not get along with City & Mountain people. I dealt with gang members in the Hmong and black culture. Chicago blacks brought the troubles with them. No matter how we helped people they didn't help themselves. I helped a scary mental ill obese client who scared my boss, found out he was not homeless, and asked me for money.

I helped a homeless sister get into La Crosse City housing. She refused to take any help once she was housed. We could not help her keep her place clean, fulfill requirements, Doctor appointments. She fought with resident's, drank & created havoc, finally was convicted. No matter what I did she would unravel life into distruction.

I met a man from Texas who worked in construction. Summers were hot so he would relocated to La crosse Salvation army claiming homeless, live there for 3 months, find a job, then go back to Texas. He used this system for 3 years and did not care.

I helped Evergreen apartments get rid of dangerous tenants who brought gang members. I helped with mental ill county clients who were fighting and assaulting other residents.

I have talked to many landlords who told me they helped homeless only to have their places trashed, including sever a l hotels in La Crosse & Onalaska.

We cannot have the Family farm anymore where in the 70's homeless or mental ill had to work for their room & board.

First as I am sure you are aware, there is no bus service to the Island on the weekends and the last buses to and from the Island are between 6am and 6pm with no service on weekends. Housing homeless with no other transportation is stranding them on the island.

Your plan seems to indicate that the homeless only occupy the building during certain times, where are they to go the other 12 hours they will not be in the hotel, especially on weekends when there is no transportation off the island?

This hotel is not near any social services, everything is off the island. Will social services be provided at the hotel location since transportation will be an issue?

The town of Campbell does not have enough police to handle the population of the Town AND the homeless population of the Norwood Inn should that be the plan. Will the City of La Crosse supply dedicated additional police services to the hotel?

The hotel has mold issues from a burst pipe of several years ago that have not been completely remediated (if at all). A look at reviews on most any travel website will show this hotel to be riddled with issues including mold, smells and security issues. Many of the reviews are titled Do Not Stay Here, or something similar. Mold remediation would be necessary and the cost is hefty. The City of La Crosse could possibly find itself the target of a lawsuit should one or more of the residences become ill due to the unhealthy situation. 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Members of LaCrosse Common Council,

I write to you today in response to Resolution 24-1068. I have had the occasion to experience the unsheltered population in LaCrosse from several different vantage points. I have been in the encampments and other shelters on multiple occasions during my employment and have had numerous conversations with them. My wife has been the victim of verbal and emotional abuse at the hands of unsheltered individuals while shopping in local stores, and I have a cousin that is a member of the unsheltered community and has been for most of his adult life, probability for 30 years or more. He is, through his own admission, responsible for the circumstances that led him to this situation, He is not an addict or alcoholic and does not live in the encampments out of concern for his own wellbeing but he does survive without causing issues for others. I have great sympathy and concern for the unsheltered population in LaCrosse. I have that sympathy because of the complete and total lack of any vision of this Council. The items that you are proposing are all worthless. These proposed solutions are just a way for you to make it look like you are doing something to help when you are just using the unsheltered community as Pawns moving them from place to place, actually putting them at risk providing them with inhuman living conditions. The largest issue that most of these individuals face is mental disease or illness. I believe that the severe drug problem in the unsheltered community is because of an opportunity for the dealers to prey on these individuals. What is needed is a real treatment facility for them to live where they can receive the care and medications that they need. Teach them the basics of living on their own and has rules and regulations for them to follow and with proper help maybe some can return to society as productive members. Until that happens most of these individuals are going to continue the path that they are on, never be employable and without any hope of improvement. Understandable that this all-costs money. I honestly do not feel that the citizens of LaCrosse would object to spending a considerable amount of money to provide a facility for these individuals if it was done right and for our citizens. Also understand that this is our money that you are playing with and not yours. The 2024 city budget is something like \$72,000,000. With a population of 52,000 that is about \$1,385 per resident. Your proposal just for security for the 260 individuals is about \$2,885 per person. Along with other cost associated with this issue I would not hesitate to say that this will end up costing closer to \$5000 or more per individual. In reality this is probably not even a City of LaCrosse issue. Most of the unsheltered population are not from LaCrosse. It is the responsibility of City government to provide its citizens with clean water, sewage and trash disposal, maintain city facilities such as parks. Address zoning and building regulations and promote the city's economic development along with providing law enforcement, public transportation and fire protection. Going through the list of departments, the city does not even have a department that is responsible for this situation. It should be left to the County, State or Federal agencies to

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provide relief. I have used the words most and majority often. I understand that not all of the unsheltered are in the same situation and that there are exceptions to everything.

In summary, I feel that this proposal should be voted down. The citizens of LaCrosse have been held hostage by a very small portion of people that are for the most part here for the benefits. They have no sense of respect for other people, or laws or much of anything else. Until the Council is ready to seriously address the real issues in this situation you should "cut bait" and stop all services and turn this over to the agencies that are equipped to do so. If there is nothing here for them, they will move on. PLEASE GIVE US OUR CITY BACK.
